Tips on Sewing on Vinyl

- 1. Don't fold your vinyl, roll it up.
- 2. Sew with a larger size needle, a 90/14. Anything smaller creates a tear strip if you have to rip out.
- 3. Use a longer stitch, such as 3.0 mm.
- 4. Use a non-stick presser foot, it is plastic.
- 5. If you don't have a plastic presser foot, you can use your walking foot or put scotch tape on the bottom of your presser foot.
- 6. Usual sewing thread is okay unless sewing on a heavier fabric. Nylon is great, as is 100% Polyester Thread.
- If your vinyl is not flat, here is what you can try:
 - Hover your iron over the top of the wrinkled vinyl to get it to soften flat; do not touch the vinyl it may melt.
 - Hang the vinyl in the warm sunshine, than lay flat.
 - Use a hair dryer to put heat on the vinyl to make it lay flat.
- 8. Use a rotary cutter, not scissors, it gives a smoother cut.
- 9. Don't make mistakes, think carefully before you stitch. If you have to rip out you will have permanent holes in the vinyl.
- 10. Do not use pins on the vinyl, it makes permanent holes. Use fabric clips, paper clips or painters tape to hold in place.
- 11. If the vinyl isn't feeding through your machine, use tissue paper; on the side giving you trouble or on both sides.
- 12. Backstitching is not suitable for vinyl.
- 13. When marking vinyl, use chalk, a marking pen will make indents in the vinyl.
- 14. Vinyl coated fabric is stronger than just vinyl; the fabric gives a layer of strength.
- 15. Lastly, experiment on a scrap before you start.

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
